Key Birding Areas

Codorus State Park has a variety of habitats including coniferous trees, mixed hardwood trees, open fields, small wetlands, and a large lake.

Hiking trails provide access to the often impenetrable forests. Mary Ann Furnace Trail leads through samplings of all habitats. The LaHo Trail passes through coniferous, hardwood, and shoreline habitats. From the trail, look for wading birds, waterfowl, and shorebirds in Wildasin Flats Cove.

The Mountain Bike Area off of Bankert Road has fields that are regenerating into a forest. Many field birds like sparrows and larks can still be found here.

Lake Marburg has 1,275 acres of sprawling coves with 26 miles of shoreline. The overlook on Hoff Road, the Main Launch off Sinsheim Road, and the parking area by the Classroom Building in the Marina Area all have great birding opportunities.

The park has a large cavity nesting trail monitored by volunteers. In the summer months, a variety of birds may be observed around the nesting boxes including eastern bluebirds, tree swallows, Carolina chickadees, tufted titmice, and other small birds.

During the winter months, birds may be observed in the Main Launch Area or at two feeding stations near the Visitor Center. Many waterfowl species visit during the winter. Also, bald eagles are often seen from the Classroom Building Area when winter nest building and incubation is taking place.

Perhaps the best birding area in the park is at the Black Rock Flats Area. Begin at Mary Ann Furnace Trailhead, and follow the boardwalk through a wetland leading to Black Rock Flats. Access this area by boat from Black Rock Boat Launch. Annually in early September, a lake draw-down creates an extensive area of mudflats, attracting migrating shorebirds. Osprey and bald eagle often look over the lake from dead snags by the water. Herons and egrets prowl the shallows stalking their prey.


Birding Tips

- 1. Wear neutral or dark clothing to blend into the natural environment.
- 2. Be prepared with binoculars and a bird guide.
- 3. Know bird habitat preferences. What you see will depend on where you look.
- 4. When possible, stand with the sun to your back to better see and identify species.
- 5. Avoid sudden movements. Sudden and jerky movements can make birds nervous.
- 6. Be quiet. Birds are easily startled by noises.
- 7. Wait for the birds to come to you. Be patient.
- 8. Look around for quiet birds.
- 9. Listen for new birds in the area.
- 10. Try "pishing" to attract small birds. Clench your teeth, open your lips and whisper the word "pish".
