


Bob Ache Memorial Forest & Arboretum Pollinator Field Map

Common Tree Species (continued)

Willow Oak

Quercus phellos
A member of the red oak family, this tree is an excellent shade tree that thrives in a variety of habitats. Long, willow-like leaves with bristle-tips adorn the tree. Acorns provide a food source for wildlife.

Carolina Silverbell

Halesia Carolina
Common in the southeastern US, this small, shrub-like tree has showy, white, bell-shaped flowers that bloom during the springtime.

Accolade Elm

Ulmus japonica and *U. wilsoniana*
Hybrid that is resistant to Dutch Elm Disease. Vigorously growing and aesthetic pleasing, this is a great urban tree.

Yellow Buckeye

Aesculus flava
The largest species of native buckeye in North America. Palmately compound leaves, as well as the buckeye nut are main identifying characteristics. The buckeye nut is poisonous to both humans and wildlife.

Pollinator Field

The pollinator field and trail were established in 2018-2019 with the help of volunteers and forestry staff. The field is an example of sustainable landscape management, with the dual purpose of limiting maintenance requirements and providing wild-life habitat. Today the field boasts a variety of wild-flower species and other native plants that promote pollinator biodiversity.

What ARE Pollinators and WHY are they important?

A pollinator is an animal or insect that carries pollen from one part of the plant to another, allowing young plants! Pollinators help to produce the food that we eat, the fibers that we use to make clothing and textiles, ingredients for medicine, and much, much more! Since pollinators do so much to help us, we can return the favor by planting native, wild plants that provide habitat and food.

Forest District Office

The present Forbes Forest District office was built in 1983, and later remodeled in 2005. The 32-acre property was donated to the Bureau of Forestry by the Western Pennsylvania Conservancy. The majority of the property surrounding the building will be held for scientific, educational, and aesthetic purposes—and be kept in its natural state.

Bob Ache Memorial Forest & Arboretum

The forest surrounding the district office was named the 'Bob Ache Memorial Forest' in honor of former Forbes State Forest District Forester, Bob Ache.

Trails meander throughout the forest and field area and may be used for hiking, biking, cross-country skiing, and snow shoeing.

While hiking throughout the forest and pollinator field, take note of the arboretum, featuring a diversity of tree species native to Pennsylvania. This guide can be used while touring the forest and pollinator area to learn about the natural history of the trees in the arboretum.

Forested trails are marked with red blazes. Please see the map for trail locations. Parking is available at the district office.


Motorized vehicles are not permitted on these trails.


