Camp William Penn

The Camp William Penn Tract totals over 330 acres and is located near the intersection of Snow Hill Road and Marshalls Creek Road in Porter Township, Pike County. Formerly a youth summer camp, this tract features a variety of mixed-oak forests and open grass fields, as well as an 8-acre pond open to catch and release fishing only. Due to its variety in habitat types and abundance of early successional habitat, this area is very popular for bird watchers. An unnamed tributary to Bush Kill Creek flows through this tract and supports a natural reproducing population of trout.



Care for the Land

SFI[®] certification focuses on protection of water quality, biodiversity, wildlife habitat, species at risk, and forests with exceptional conservation value. Dual certification ensures that Pennsylvania's state forests are managed to the highest third-party standards.
