Fred WoodsTrail

The Fred Woods Trail was created by the Camp Quehanna Young Adult Conservation Corps in the summer of 1980.


The hiking only trail was established in memory of Frederick Woods, a Forest Foreman with the Bureau of Forestry, who was fatally injured in an accident while performing his duties on state forest land.



Trail Information

The Fred Woods Trail is 4.57 miles long and marked in yellow paint. To find the trail, head west on Route 555 from Driftwood and turn right onto Mason Hill Road. Go 3.75 miles on Mason Hill Road and the trailhead will be on your left and the parking will be on your right.

Dual certification ensures that Pennsylvania's state forests are managed to the highest third-party standards.
