#### **Area Facts**



The distinctive white birch forest at Marion Brooks Natural Area

- > Area is 975 acres.
- Tract is found west of the Quehanna Wild Area in southeastern Elk County.
- Area is located within Pennsylvania's Allegheny Plateau ecoregion.
- Area is part of the Pennsylvania Wilds, a vast wilderness consisting of eight state forests.
- ➤ Area was extensively logged in the early 1900s.

# **Ecosystem/Terrain**

- ➤ The forest at Marion Brooks is substantially affected by the area's history of logging and wildfire, whose poor resulting soils derived this unique white birch community.
- ➤ Other common tree species include hardwoods like red oak and sassafras, as well as evergreens like hemlock, pitch pine, and white pine.

➤ Terrain is essentially flat or gently sloping at approximately 2000' elevation.

#### Wildlife

- The natural area provides important habitat for many species of birds, including several warbler species.
- The area is part of Pennsylvania's elk range.

- The buds of white birches are an important winter food for the state bird, the ruffed grouse.
- Frame species like deer, turkey, and bear are common in the natural area and may be hunted during appropriate seasons.

### Access

- ➤ The Quehanna Highway is the main route leading to the area.
- ➤ Deible and Losey roads access the area north of the Quehanna Highway.
- ➤ The Quehanna Highway can be accessed by Route 555 to the north, and by Route 879 to the south.
- ➤ US80 is a preferred route from points far east and west of the natural area.
