#### **Key Birding Areas**

Prince Gallitzin State Park has great birding opportunities throughout the year. Wetlands, forests, open fields, and the lake provide many areas for a diversity of bird species to thrive.

The 1,635 acre Glendale Lake is the centerpiece of the park, offering many locations to scan the water for ducks, geese, loons and grebes. In spring migration, gulls, loons, and waterfowl are typically seen from at the Prince Gallitzin Marina In the spring and fall, Killbuck Cove is usually full of waterfowl in large groups using the park as a resting stop during migration. In the winter, waterfowl may be found in Turtle Cove Access area, where the persistent wind tends to keep ice from forming. In fall, look into Slate Lick Cove from Marina Road to see ducks convening in the marshy area. In the summer, most waterfowl has ventured north, but look for Osprey and Bald Eagles as they fish. Spring through fall, the shoreline, especially along Gibbons Road, may have migrating sandpipers.

The field habitat in the Headache Hill area has birds that prefer a more open environment. Common yellowthroats, song sparrows, and house wrens are easily found in the summer as they tend to their nests. Around the nest boxes, Tree swallows and eastern bluebirds fly back and forth. Look for purple martins swarming their nesting colony near the marina. Swallows also rest near the marina during their in spring migration. In autumn, palm warblers can be found in open habitat feeding on the ground. Come winter, sparrows and juncos scavenge for whatever seeds and berries can be found.

In the canopy of the forests, the trees come alive each spring with the songs and colors of warblers, vireos, and orioles along Troxell Point, Campground Loop, and Bollinger trails. Come fall, mixed flocks of resident, and transient species can be found on that same trail. During winter, nomadic flocks of year-round residents comb the trees for overwintering insect eggs and leftover fruit.

#### Birding Tips

- 1. Wear neutral or dark clothing to blend into the natural environment.
- 2. Be prepared with binoculars and a bird guide.
- 3. Know bird habitat preferences. What you see will depend on where you look.
- 4. When possible, stand with the sun to your back to better see and identify species.
- 5. Avoid sudden movements. Sudden and jerky movements can make birds nervous.
- 6. Be quiet. Birds are easily startled by noises.
- 7. Wait for the birds to come to you. Be patient.
- 8. Look around for quiet birds.
- 9. Listen for new birds in the area.
- 10. Try "pishing" to attract small birds. Clench your teeth, open your lips and whisper the word "pish".




