# Forbes State Forest Trail Steward Program

The Trail Steward Program is a volunteer opportunity for individuals who want to assess, monitor, and implement trail improvements on specific trail(s) on Forbes State Forest. Individuals can adopt one or more trails to be routinely monitored and maintained throughout the year. This alternative volunteer opportunity will provide forest staff and management with insight on trail maintenance needs, while also providing forest visitors with quality trails to use in Forbes State Forest. Be the eyes and ears of the forest to help us improve recreation opportunities for all!

### Trail Steward responsibilities include:

- Monitor adopted trail <u>at least 2 times</u> (3 times preferred spring, summer, and fall) during the year and completing individual trail assessment forms per each individual assessment.
- Trail assessments and volunteer hours will be reported to the environmental education specialist volunteer hours will also need to be recorded in the DCNR conservation volunteer database.
- Work alongside other forest staff and/or volunteers to implement trail improvement projects on adopted section of trail.

### Guidelines for the Trail Steward include:

- Individuals must attend a Trail Steward training session that will take place after applications are reviewed and approved. Dates and Times for this training are TBD based on number of applicants and interest.
- Trail Stewards must be registered as a DCNR conservation volunteer and must fill out and submit a Trail Steward application to forestry staff.
  - All Trail Stewards must be preapproved by our forest staff through an easy application process.
- Trail stewards MUST receive pre-approval from Forbes State Forest staff prior to starting any trail improvement projects.
- Trail Stewards are NOT, under any circumstances, permitted to fell live, standing trees. Chainsaw use
  is ONLY permitted if the steward has taken Forbes State Forest's chainsaw training course and ONLY
  small, downed trees are permitted to be cut.
  - o For safety, we encourage chainsaw use only when with another person. PPE must be used.
- Trail Stewards must wear PPE at all times if using tools and equipment for trail maintenance this
  includes eye protection, work gloves, long pants, ear protection (if applicable), chainsaw chaps (if
  applicable), hard hat and face guard (if applicable).
- Trail Stewards must be at least 18 years old to participate in this program.
